



Railway Station

Built 1862-63 for the London & North-Western Railway Co. Originally part of a matching pair of adjacent stations, the other one being demolished during the 'Beeching era', 1969-70.



The Savoy, Hall Bank

Built as The Burlington Hotel, 1874
Designed by Robert Rippon Duke



Nos. 12 to 28 Spring Gardens
 Row of six shops built during the 1860's



No. 16 (Hargreaves), retains the original shop front and interior fittings.



The Paxton Suite

Opened in 1889 as 'The Entertainment Stage' by actor John Toole, and later renamed 'The New Theatre'. After the opening of The Opera House it was fitted out to show silent films as 'The Hippodrome'. In the 1950's it was known as The Playhouse and hosted an annual repertory company. Redesigned internally in 2008 to provide multiple performance spaces.



The Pavilion Gardens – The Central Hall

Built 1870 by Edward Milner
Burnt down in 1982 and rebuilt as restaurant and coffee shop.



The Pavilion Gardens – The Conservatory

Originally known as ‘The Promenade’ and built 1870-71 by Edward Milner.



The Pavilion Gardens – The Octagonal Hall

Built 1875-76 and designed by Robert Rippon Duke. Restored 1994



Winster Place, Spring Gardens

Built as The Royal Hotel for Andrew Brittlebank, a solicitor of Winster, Derbyshire in 1849-52.
The architect was Samuel Worth of Sheffield. Later offices for The Buxton Lime Firms Co.
(subsequently I.C.I.)



The Palace Hotel

Built as The Buxton Hotel, a speculative venture 1864-66
Designed in the French Chateau style by Henry Currey.
Renamed The Palace Hotel in 1867.



No 9 Terrace Road

Mid C19, housed the Post Office telephone exchange after the 2nd World War.
Now offices.



Old Court House

Originally part of the 19C Promenade Room. Later partly used as estate offices for the Duke of Devonshire, also local board offices and a Masonic
